As part of our approach to rewards and praise, we expect pupils to embody virtues that link to the school's values of Wisdom, Resilience and Kindness. The table below demonstrates the virtuous behaviours all members of our school community should uphold and examples of what these look like in school. These are underpinned by the 'Golden Mean' concept and link to the building blocks of character which are intellectual, moral, civic and performance virtues. Pupils are rewarded through praise and recognition in assemblies, shoutouts, being awarded ePraise points, stickers and celebrations in newsletters and on social media.
